I know about it as I have been very near to me, my daughter-in-law with her five children, four girls, and the last a little boy of eight, the widow and childress of my second son Pierre, who was killed as a captain in 1944 at the time of liberation of France. My eldest son Louis, the Dominican father, came back from Germany in 1942 in pretty good condition, he stays in Paris, teaching Philosophy in the Catholic University; he went twice also in Spain during this year, teaching in the Salamanque University and in that of Barcelona.

My third son Henri, also Dominican father is Holy Scripture professor near Paris. I see them mostly when I go for a visit to my youngest daughter, Françoise who lives in Paris. She is married with a engineer,

Michel Marterol and has five children. My eldest daughter, Marie, wife de Lombard has seven children, they live in Morocco where her husband has farming business. She married his eldest daughter Mynes, 21, old to Michel de Lacqueray last July. The wedding took place in France, their summer country-house, near Grenoble, but the young couple live also in Morocco.

My second daughter Jeanne, who is not married has come home a few months ago after two years spent in Indo-China as "assistante sociale militaire". She now manages a "Children's Home" in Morocco not far from her sister but she writes it is quite calm and quiet in their place and know nothing like the Casablanca troubles which were rapidly ended.
